



**25 INDICTED IN CUBA**  
 Alleged Communists Accused of Following Movements of U. S. Envoy.  
 HAVANA, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Twenty-five asserted Communists arrested after soldiers charged they were following too closely the movements of United States Ambassador Jefferson Caffery today were indicted and held for trial on charges of illegal assembly.

**M.E. PASTORS VOTE SALARY AID PLAN**  
 Conference at Elyria Votes for Practical Application of Brotherhood Idea.

ELYRIA, O., Sept. 12.—Practical application of the principles of brotherhood preached from their pulpits was voted by members of the Northeast Ohio Methodist Episcopal Conference in session at First Methodist Church here, when action was taken today to supplement salaries of ministers in the lowest salary brackets by contributions to a sustentation fund by higher paid members.

Each minister in the conference receiving more than \$1,000 annually will be asked to contribute 2 per cent of his salary above that amount. This will be used by a special committee of the conference to relieve the situation of less fortunate pastors.

Dr. F. W. Mueller of Philadelphia, general secretary of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension, asserted that the Methodist denomination nationally faces an indebtedness of \$10,000,000. This constitutes an unprecedented emergency, with many institutions and local churches facing foreclosure and liquidation.

**Backs Government Control.**  
 Declaring that "we are at the dawn of a new day," Dr. Edmund H. Chaffee, pastor of the Labor Temple in New York City, speaking tonight before the 100 pastors and delegates, said Christian ministry is facing three principal issues, economic, war and the state.

"We have emerged from the economy of necessity into the economy of plenty. It is now possible to give every man, woman and child the material basis for the good life."  
 Declaring that planning is a necessity for efficient machine production, Dr. Chaffee said that no real planning, with the interest of the whole people at heart, can be made except by governmental authority.

"This means that our basic industries would have to be controlled by governmental authority," he asserted.

**Reduce World Services Deficit.**  
 The conference voted approval of a recommendation to observe the second Sunday of January as "Sanctuary Day," when a special offering in the churches is to be taken to relieve the situation.

Dr. N. E. Davis of Chicago, superintendent of Hospitals and Homes, reported that the world services agencies of the church had reduced their deficit on their budget from \$700,000 a year ago to \$350,000 for the current year.

Rev. Carl Asmus, minister of First Methodist Church, Stevens Point, Wis., was announced as successor to Rev. Edwin A. Brown at Broadway Methodist Church, Cleveland, by Presiding Bishop Ernest G. Richardson. Rev. Mr. Brown begins a pastorate at Kenwood Methodist Church, Milwaukee, Sunday.

In the first of three addresses on "The Christian Church" this afternoon, Dr. Charles Clayton Morrison of Chicago, editor of the Christian Century, asserted that the church would not "be down" before any doctrine of totalitarianism. He called the church a unique social institution with a ruler higher than the state.

The lay conference, consisting of nearly 800 representative laymen, will convene in a separate session in First Congregational Church tomorrow morning. United sessions with the ministers will be held Friday and Saturday mornings.
