

Dr. Alfred Maschke Dies at 89, General Practitioner 50 Years

Private services for Dr. Alfred S. Maschke, a widely known Cleveland physician and a founder, former director and chief of medicine at Mount Sinai Hospital, were held yesterday. Dr. Maschke. who was 89, died at the hospital yesterday.

Dr. Maschke, who retired about 10 years ago, was a general practitioner, pediatrician, a specialist in internal medicine and diseases of the ear, nose and throat. He was widely known as an excellent physical diagnostician and internist. He had practiced in Cleveland for more than 50 years, maintaining offices at 7016 Euclid Avenue.

Dr. Maschke was the brother of the late Maurice Maschke, a long-time Republican power in Cuyahoga County, who died in 1936. As. Dr. Maschke used to tell the story, the late Republican leader ran home from his first grade He switched from the study class at Rockwell School, on steps of his parents' apartment above their grocery at Lake and Seneca Streets, for it was his sixth birthday and he had been promised a present after school.

When he asked for his present, someone quieted him and took him into another room to show him his present, his new brother, Alfred.

DR. MASCHKE studied abroad as well as in Cleveland. He studied at the Nothnagel Clinic in Vienna, the University of Vienna, the Karolinen-Kinderspital in Vi-Hospital, London.

In 1905, Dr. Maschke took Pirque, who was working on skin tests for tuberculosis. Dr. Maschke also had studied with Robert Koch, who isolated the tubercle bacillus.

As a result of this work he became a founder and longtime member of the Cleveland Anti-Tuberculosis League. He also was a founder and one of the first presidents of the Pasteur Club, and of the Children's Fresh Air

Camp and opened the first public bath house in Cleveland on Woodland Avenue.
